
Premier's Reading Challenge

The Year 5 Introductory program, o ered in Term 4, had over 30 participants. With some new changes to the software being introduced by LEGO posing new challenges for the boys and their coaches.

Year 6 students have been focusing on coding and construction of EV3 robots. These skills were then put in place in the Term 4 internal FLL competition.

Year 7 students completed programming of their EV3 LEGO robots using Python. Year 9 and 10 iSTEM students also used this time to work on their class-based projects.
